MAIN STRATEGIES AND PRIORITIES

These are the main strategies and priorities which the community will work closely and in partnership with local groups, landowners, local businesses, the public sector and developers /contractors to secure community and local economic benefit from investment in the island.



THEME 1: TRANSPORT, ROADS AND ACCESS TO SERVICES

A significant issue for the community is the poor condition of the single track road. This being the only road, there is a strong feeling within the community to lobby for major road improvement which also includes surfacing and marking of passing places.

Traffic volume is on the increase to the island as tourists are becoming more aware of Jura as a destination, in addition to this the community i also a growing one. As a result of these positive development factors, our existing ferry service is under demand pressures. The community recognised this as a main priority as well as improvement to connecting transport services As a result of the 2016 housing survey and the for onward travel i.e. connecting buses, ferries CAP survey a need was expressed for housing, and flights outbound and inbound.

The Isle of Jura is fortunate to have a good medical practice and a Progressive Care Centre, however, these services need protected and supported. The community is also keen to maintain and improve links to other health care services on Islay. Some key factors were to re-instate the dental van to the island. Currently residents have to travel for almost a full day for check-ups and appointments to Islay.

A key concern in both the survey and the community event was the lack of telecommunications and broadband service. Certain parts of the village are well served with broadband whilst other areas out with have a very poor or like to see superfast broadband rolled out across all homes on the island. Mobile phone coverage is also very poor with some areas not able to get signal at all. This all in all would cement a more sustainable community allowing people to work from home as well as supporting local industry and businesses.

The community would like to see more opportunity for local business start-up, skills trade to help people expand and/or sustain which could hopefully create more local employment. This could be supported by the creation of new workspaces and small retail facilities.

In order to sustain our working population support for childcare provision was identified. This would allow parents, and carers to remain and/or return to employment which is a key factor in sustaining the population growth.

The community would like to see a better use of the bay and its facilities to encourage visitor income, promote outdoor recreation as well as look at ways to generate other community funds.


